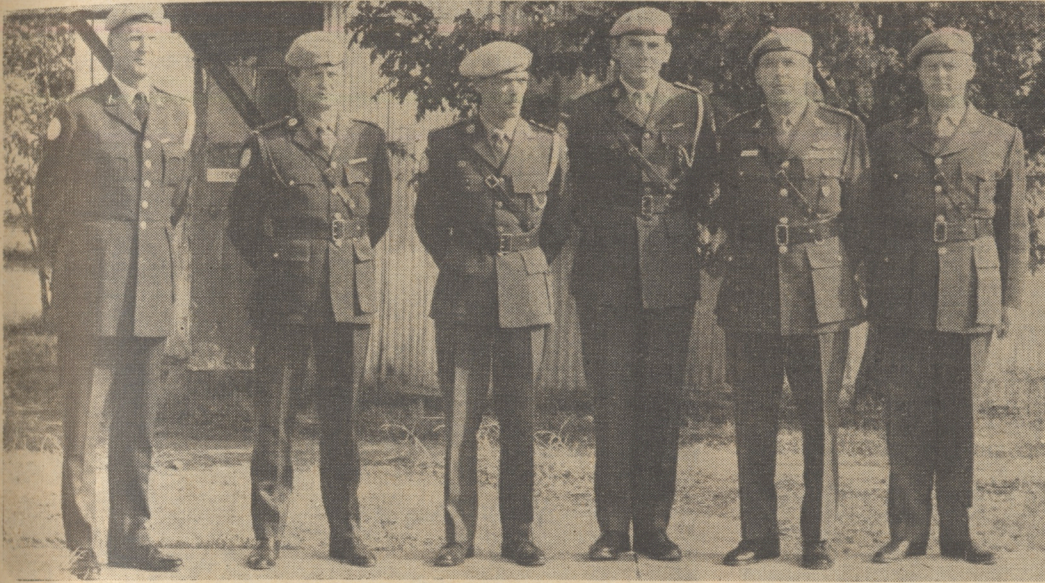

INJURED RAF MEN IN MOUNTAIN RESCUE

TWO injured members of the Near East Air Force Mountain Rescue team helped a Finnish member of the U.N. Peace Force (Pte Kotiranta, of Peace Force (Pte Kotiranta, of and fallen 400 ft on Troodos last Sunday.

The two RAF men, Cpl. David Wright of RAF Episkopi and SAC John Little of Akrotiri, were left in the Troodos base camp at Mount Olympus while the rest of them were practising recoveries elsewhere.

On receiving an emergency call, the two men took a stretcher from the ambulance stationed at Troodos and SAC Little, who only left hospital on Thursday after injuring his knee playing rugby, lowered Cpl Wright and an RAF policeman to the scene.

LOUROUJINA

Indkvarteringen sker i barakker og 24 mands telte, men disse har bl.a. på grund af varigheden efterhånden fået en hyggelig og god indretning.

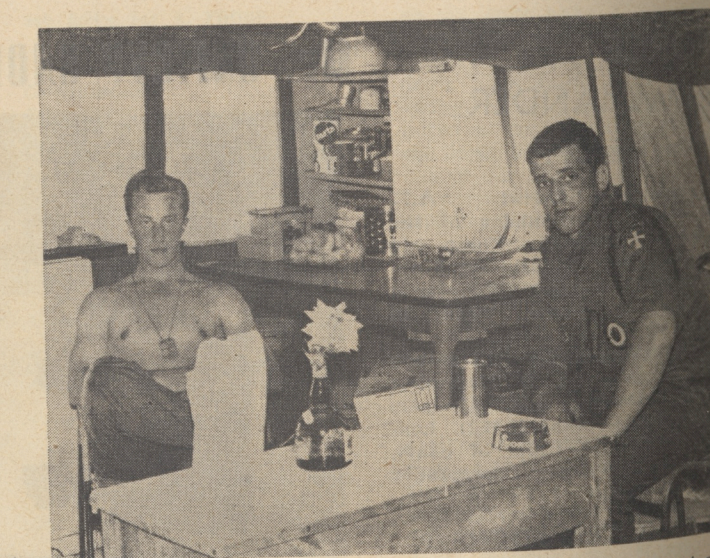

CONCERT AT LEFKA



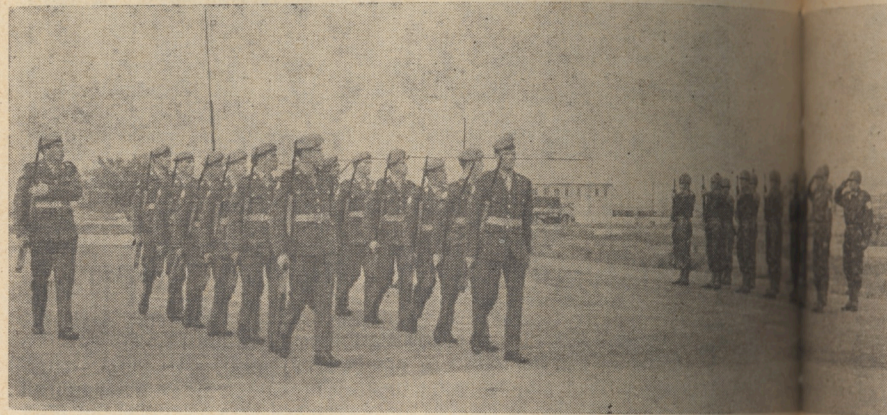
The men of 'A' Company took to the stage on Sunday night last and treated a large audience to a few hours of music, song and comedy sketches.

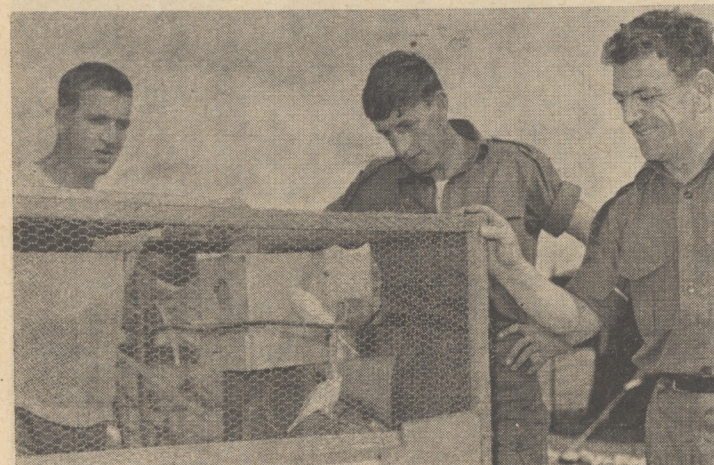


CHANGING THE GUARD

SMØRREBRØD AND ALL THAT!

The Officers Mess, HQ UNFICYP could well have been transformed to Denmark last Thursday when Major I.S. Haslund-Christensen organised a Danish evening. Lt Col F. Hansen-Nord, Commander Danish Contingent closely followed by twenty-plus bottles of Akvavit and Cherry Heering ensured the traditional customs were adhered to!

On the tables were pamphlets, supplied by Tuborg containing some amusing views about the Danish way of life. Below are republished some historical facts which point towards the ancient and close association of England and Denmark and vice-versa!

HISTORICAL FACTS

(or what, in a broad sense, has happened in Denmark in the last thousand years or more).

Actually, not very much is known about the doings of the Danes in the year 13,000 B.C. But, at any rate, it is known that about 5,000 B.C. they acquired a great enthusiasm for eating oysters. That custom has come right down to our own days, with only one sad difference, the price of oysters has gone up. Confirmation of this old habit is found in the famous prehistoric "koekkenmoedding" or "kitchen-middens". Historic times in Denmark begin a little sadly in the year 950 when King Gorm the Old died. From him there has continued an almost unbroken line of monarchs to our own Frederick the Ninth. In 1013 King Sweyn Forkbeard undertook the conquest of England and in 1016 Canute the Great was King of England. The tactical methods of launching invasions in England seem to have been lost later. There is reason to think that when the two Danish kings conquered England, they brought with them the fore-runners for Tuborg Beer in Great Britain.

In the following centuries, the Danes happened to subjugate a great part of Europe in an amazing fashion, and in 1397 Queen Margrette united Scandinavia.

About 1600, the first guest performance of Hamlet was arranged at Kronberg although it cannot be said with certainty whether or not Mr Shakespeare himself took part in the play at Elsinore.

In the succeeding centuries, there were wars with Sweden, England and other good friends.

About 1770, Struensee began to work a bit for the coming of democracy, but he was executed because his interest in the fair lady, English-born Queen Caroline Mathilde, was a little too great.

In 1849, Denmark got its first free and democratic constitution; since then democracy has been preserved steadfastly except for that period between 1940 and 1945, when the fight for democracy and freedom was stronger than ever before.

The account of Danish history given above leaves out many details, but those who are more interested can easily follow them up in numerous more elaborate handbooks.

He scored the first goal against the Austrians, despite this he is not included in the pool of 18. Two others out, are his Manchester United colleague, Willie Morgan, and Willie Wallace of Celtic.

They are replaced by Colin Stein, Rangers recent £100,000 signing, his former Hibernian colleague, Peter Cormack, whose only previous full international was against Brazil in 1966.

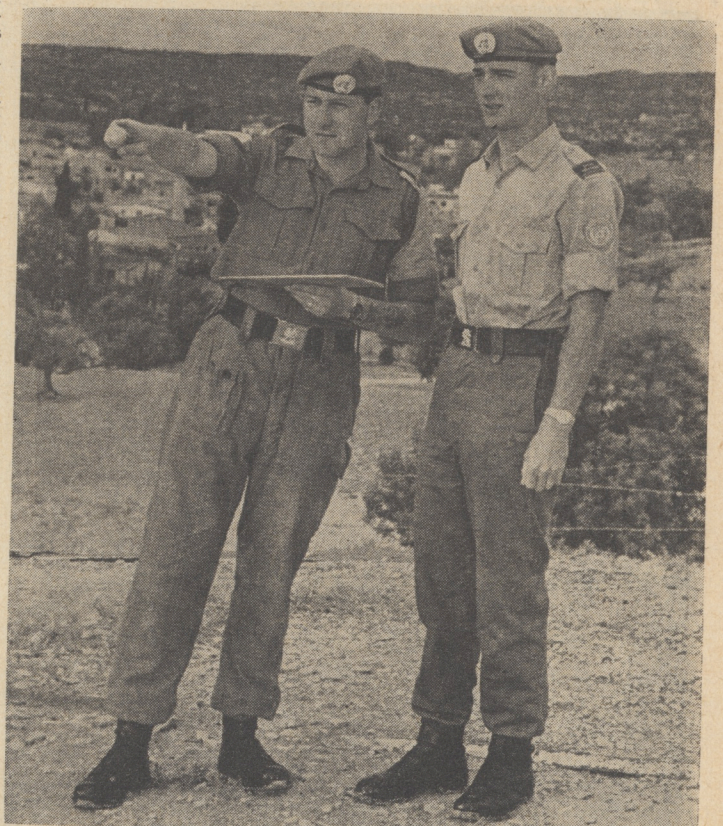
TIGER NEWS

Suomen Kypros-pataljoonan historiassa lienee tuskin kertaakaan aikaisemmin tapahtunut sellaista, että jokin osasto olisi ollut maastoharjoituksissa runsaan viikon yhteen menoon. Siksi pidämme aiheellisenä palata pataljoonan tiedustelujoukkueen jäljille Kyrenian vuoristoon uudelleen.

The lower photograph the ranks are from left to right: Lieutenant Colonel, Major, Captain, (the rank of Lieutenant, a single ring, is missing), Chief Warrent Officer, Master Warrent Officer, Warrent Officer, Sergeant, Corporal, with crown mounted, and Private 1st Class.

The new uniform will be taken into general wear next year.
